Hello Fellow Garden Club Members,

Yes, the changing colors of the leaves have been specular this year. I hope you all have taken some time to enjoy this change of seasons. Reds, orange, and yellows with the sun streaming thru has been awe inspiring. But the wind today has loosened their grasp on the trees and so they fall.

What to do? Consider leaving them where they fall or raking to a area with trees (which provide free mulch). Leaving them provides mini habitats for luna moths, fritillarie butterfly and other caterpillars. In addition to salamanders, chipmunks, wood frogs, box turtles and toads. Many of our insects and small critters rely on them to get thru winter.

Many thanks to all the volunteers who continue to help plant, weed and design the many gardens we are involved with. The number is impressive. We can always use more volunteers, in a variety of ways from showing up, to opening bags of bulbs, donating plants and being supportive. Homework helpers is still looking for volunteers to help with their projects. Please refer to Mums the Word for times and dates.

Just a reminder, that even though Episcopal Church of the Redeemer has loosened their mask mandate, it is important for us to continue that practice. We have many members who attend meetings because they feel safe in this environment. I would hate to think that

CIVIC BEAUTIFICATION UPDATE

Since our last club meeting, we have continued with our fall gardening workdays:

October 26th was **Daffodil Project** and we diligently planted more than 300 daffodil bulbs at several Redeemer church sites: main sign, preschool sign, kitchen door, and the preschool



playground gate. We also planted more Sir Winston Churchills at

the Salisbury Brigstock entrance. Other types of daffodil bulbs were Dutch Master, Ice Folly and Carlton. Our intrepid crew was comprised of Connie Sorrell (manager), Nancy Lee, Sandy Fry, Barbara Metz, Kerri Butler, and Meg Winn.

October 28th at **Redeemer Courtyard**, Dawn Lerch (manager) led us in pulling out the still verdant begonias, coleus and elephant ears and planting some pansies. Peggy Young, Nancy Lee, Meg Winn, and Gary Lerch helped. Several of us harvested some huge elephant ear bulbs to over winter in the garage.

October 29, 30 and Nov 1st were all unofficial workdays at the **preschool playground** and at the **preschool sign garden**. We've been busy planting all the donations provided by generous

fellow gardeners. Nancy Lee, Peggy Young, and Meg Winn worked at the sites. A list of donors and the plants will be provided later.

November 4th was the **Post Office** workday. We pulled out the still-pretty zinnias before the frost got them and planted more Tahiti daffodil bulbs and orange tulips. Then we planted a dozen quart-size golden and orange pansies. We had a bumper

Still to come are a "paint plant" from Carol Romeo and peach-colored chrysanthemums from Dominique Spinos.

Gifts for the Gardener

Six specially selected Salisbury Garden Club members came up with these dynamite gift ideas for your favorite gardener and to send to those who love you with items circled. Here goes:



- Bulbs amaryllis, narcissus, hyacinths minimum care bulbs that brighten the winter and provide a beautiful scent! (Remember, some people DON'T like the smell of narcissus, so it's a good gift for people you don't like too.) The waxed amaryllis is perfect for family in senior living as they require no care.
- 2. **Bulb planter for drill** (\$12-\$30 for the attachment to your drill).
- 3. **Bee house** for mason bees and other solitary bees to use to lay their eggs. Ideally, a bee house provides a safe space away from predators, weather, and chemicals, all of which can interfere with a successful reproductive cycle (\$9-\$15).
- 4. Penny Pines doesn't telling your friend that you bought her 1000 little pine trees that will be used to reforest a barren area sound impressive? You can do it for \$10.00 and write her a beautiful card (see #5). Perfect gift for the environmentalist in your bunch. See Helen Davison.
- 5. **SCG** stationery our stationery is the prettiest out there and reasonably priced. Put a box with some garden gloves, new clippers and interesting seeds and you have a great gift. See Linda Nau.
- 6. Mosquito killer that doesn't obliterate every living insect. There are nine listed on-line as excellent for 2021, and one example is the DynaTrap Insect Trap (\$60-\$90). This is a simple way to safeguard your living space from mosquitoes by trapping insects without the use of chemicals.
- Rain gauge collects water falling on it and records the change over time in rainfall depth. Search on-line for "Nine Best Rain Gauge Reviews 2021" for details and prices.
- 8. **Garden clogs or boots** why do we love these? They're washable durable, usually brightly colored and keep us out of the mud (\$50.)
- 9. Rooting Hormone (\$6-\$10) We are going to need this for our young plants while they form their own root systems. It's an odd but appreciated gift for discerning gardeners. Pair it with a bag of Epsom salts and some worm castings organic fertilizer and you'll have your friends scratching their heads.
- Lewis Ginter membership (Individual \$85-or Senior \$65). To guarantee deliver of a mailed gift certificate by Christmas, place your order by Friday, December 17.

- 11. Bag of **Starbucks coffee grounds** free for pickup at your nearby Starbucks and so good for your clay...er, soil.
- 12. Garden books, magazine subscriptions like Garden Gate.
- 13. Garden statues.
- 14. **New clippers** it's so easy to lose them and there's always room for another pair! For gardeners, new clippers are like a new box of crayons on the first day of school.
- 15. Gift cards from favorite garden centers.
- **16.** A **session** with a professional garden designer.
- 17. A wardrobe of garden gloves: tough ones for thorny stuff, close-fitting and slim ones for designing arrangements.
- 18. Kalanchoe, cyclamen, Christmas cactus or other **blooming house plants** to brighten winter.
- 19. **Pre-planted pot** with evergreen, bulbs, pansies for the terrace or deck.
- 20. A yard man for a few hours to do the heavy work you've been wanting to do.
- 21. Bird feeder.
- 22. Set of candles or torch stakes for the terrace or porch.
- 23. A trellis.
- 24. "Garden wine" (that's the same as "dinner wine" only you drink it in the garden.)
- 25. **Good tools for old hands!** Two great sources are www.seedsandspades.com and www.hobbr.com.
- 26. Cute watering can for use for potted or indoor plants
- 27. **Special clippers** for a designing friend, with a roll of raffia, twine, moss, pebbles, and other elements.
- 28. A moisture meter (\$10=\$264.) This handy gadget measures humidity in the soil and helps prevent overwatering or underwatering plants.
