NGC and the USDA Forest Service are proud to have formed a partnership sustaining our national and urban forests through this reforestation/forest education program.

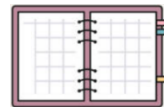

## COMMITTEE REPORTS



### CIVIC BEAUTIFICATION – Meg Winn

This is our busy season and we've accomplished a lot since the September meeting.

September 21<sup>st</sup> - Nancy Lee, DanaDee Carragher, and Meg Winn weeded and pruned at the **Wishing Well Park**. More donated plants will go in soon.

September 26<sup>th</sup> - Nancy Lee contacted Captain Durham at the **Midlothian Fire Station** to coordinate plans for club projects there. With some diligent prior shopping and procuring on Kerri Butler's part,

we installed two large containers with arborvitae and "spiller"-type plants in front of the building. The plan is to maintain these and replace the small plants as needed. We can also use them as part of our holiday decorations in December. While scouting the area, we saw a monarch butterfly fluttering near the extensive rain garden planted on the south side of the building. in front of the station.



September 27<sup>th</sup> - DanaDee Carragher, Doris Wier, Peggy Young, Susan McClelland, and Meg Winn met at the **Anniversary Garden** for general clean-up and pruning. We

transplanted more Obedient plants in front of the fence, divided the dwarf Siberian iris, and cut back the peonies.

September 29<sup>th</sup> - Barbara Metz, Kerri Butler, Anita King, and Meg Winn pruned and weeded at the **Midlothian Post Office**. We also admired our zinnias and angelonias still blooming beautifully.

October 6<sup>th</sup> - Peggy Young, Kerri Butler, and Meg Winn met at the **Lifelong Learning**



**Institute** to plan the design at our new flower garden. Then Monday, Oct.9<sup>th</sup> we returned and were joined by Fran Judd, DanaDee Carragher, Nancy Lee, Marsha Caratelli, and Kelly Tartaglia for planting the border. All the plants were donated by Dominique Spinos, Janice Beatty, Gay Kistler, Peggy Young, and Meg

Winn. Some of the plants are Siberian iris, chrysanthemums, various asters, bell flowers, columbine, abelia, and carex. Our initial project was complete in less than three hours and we will monitor it and water weekly through the fall. Next work day we will tuck in assorted bulbs and more donated perennials and groundcovers.

We have a great team of managers and wonderful volunteers working together to beautify our environment.

**Upcoming Projects:** Our **Annual Daffodil Project** will take place **October 30 at 9:30 AM**. It's time to plant bulbs!

## ***Next Month's Program: Introduction to Ikebana by Annette Ernst***



*Annette Ernst will give us an Introduction to Ikebana at our November 15 General Meeting. She has been active in Ikebana of Richmond since 2010 members are most active in six of the thousands of Ikebana Schools. Annette's presentation will introduce arrangements from four schools, progressing chronologically. The students follow the philosophy of arranging flowers, retaining their vital forces which have the power to transform the human heart and mind, and enliven any space.*

## **What's Your Type?**

Do you enjoy making floral designs that are a certain type (Parallel, Transparency, Underwater, etc.)? Do you have the *Designing by Types* book, but wish that it included some of the newer design types (Low Profile, Grouped Mass, etc.) Do you get inspired by looking at photos of designs? If you answered YES!, the Florida Judges Council has available notebook inserts that you may be interested in.

These inserts, each set covering 10 different design types, give clear instructions on what is important for the design type (Forget-Me-Nots), pitfalls to be careful of when designing and design photos with either a list of plant materials used or information on how the designer put the design together. It also talks about the six design principles by which the designs are judged.

A copy of the 2022 and 2023 edition of *What's Your Type* will be available for viewing at our October meeting. They are available for pre-order at \$25 each. These are half page sized and pre-punched to fit in a small three-ring binder – perhaps your club yearbook binder!?

## **TIPS FOR USING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES IN YOUR DESIGNS**



What better way to celebrate autumn than to create a design echoing the beauty of the season?

It can be fun to incorporate fall harvests by using vegetables and fruits in your arrangement. It can also be tricky because they are susceptible to bacteria. In order to make your fruits and vegetables in your designs endure, here are some tips:

1. First, wash all fruits and veggies with soap and water. Rinse and dry thoroughly.
2. If you're using a skewer, floral pick or wire, use a solution of 50% oil of cloves and 50 % oil of cinnamon. Dip the skewer, pick or wire briefly into the solution. This will delay bacteria.
3. If you cut the fruit or vegetable, apply Graumbacher Fixative, Krylon Crystal Clear Coating spray or liquid floor wax to the area.
4. Cabbages or brussel sprouts can emit a strong aroma. Wash them in a mild bleach and water solution.

These suggestions will help your seasonal creations last longer and give you more time to enjoy them!

## Horticultural Hints

It's that time of year again when we enjoy the cooler days and nights but we know that the shorter days signify the end of summer. Most of my summer flowers and vegetables miss the warm sunshine and are finished. However, there's some wonderful flowers that really shine now. My wood asters, "Aster novi-belgii", are in full bloom and look like tiny white stars in a dark green landscape. Asters require long days for vegetative growth and short days for bud development. Supposedly deer don't like asters and mums but I protect them in the spring when the growth is young and tender.

My success story this year has been the dahlias that we started from seed in the house in the late winter. We've learned that dahlias do not grow true to their parent unless you buy tubers. So, every seed is a surprise waiting to grow! Even under our limited indoor lighting situation we were able to get 9 plants to grow and plant outside. Most were planted in large pots on and around our deck because they needed protection from both deer and voles. To our surprise many of these



dahlias grew up to 6' tall! It was like Christmas when each plant had a bud open and we got to see its color and shape. Now they are covered with flowers and bees because, they too, prefer the cooler weather and shorter days. Hopefully we will be able to save the tubers when the plants die after a heavy frost. That will give us dahlia tubers to both plant and share come springtime.

Growing from seed this year had its successes and failures. Our very young cosmos plants were pulled out and eaten by the birds. But our zinnias were wonderful! We are going to learn from this year and try again next year with some different flowers. Gardening is always an ongoing adventure and not for the faint hearted!
