
CIVIC BEAUTIFICATION - Meg Winn

TRIP TO PHILADELPHIA FLOWER SHOW MARCH 4-6, 2024



The 195th Philly Flower Show, presented by the Philadelphia Horticulture Society, will be held March

2nd through the 10th. Several members are planning to go on Monday, March 4 and return on March 6. Each person is responsible for purchasing his/her own train and flower show tickets and making hotel reservations.

The hotel is the **Hilton Garden Inn Philadelphia Center City**, (1100 Arch Street) right across the street from the Flower Show. The price for a queen room is about \$150+ a night.

We will take the Amtrack train (Staples Mills Road station) on Monday morning at 8:23 am and return from Philadelphia on Wednesday on 1:01 pm train. A round trip cost is about \$106.00.

Tickets to the Flower Show can be purchased online at https://phsonline.org/the-flower-show at \$39.00 a day if you buy them ahead of time.

The Flower Show theme this year is *United by Flowers*, a celebration of the community that blooms each Spring at the annual PHS Philadelphia Flower Show – a moment when hundreds of thousands from the region, East Coast, and the world share in a week-long magnification of the transformative power of gardening.

Gardening Resolutions for 2024

When you're thinking about your resolutions, remember to consider your garden. What will you resolve to do in this new year? Anything different? I know I'll make some changes! Here are some suggestions:

• If you haven't had your soil tested in 3 years, winter is a great time to do that so you can amend before planting in the spring.

 Add compost to your soil to enhance the nutrients and keep weeds at bay. I promise to turn my compost pile more often (maybe twice a month?)

- Check out the USDA website to find your plant hardiness zone https://planthardiness.ars.usda.gov/. There is a lot of interesting information!
- Of course, take time to plan your garden for next year. Take some measurements and sketch a design of how you'd like it to look. Consider the topography, the exposure, and the structures.



- Look around your garden and see what worked and what didn't. Make plans to transplant or remove, if necessary. Right plant, right place.
- Add more natives.
- Clean out your garden shed (oh, the mess!)
- Look at the seed catalogs and try something new.



 Keep a calendar about your gardening activities with notes and photos about seed sowing, planting, pruning, feeding, mulching, weeding, deadheading.



• Resolve to take time to appreciate your garden. We all should "stop and smell the roses" more often. Share the joy by inviting your friends over to delight in the sights and sounds of your garden!
